Road works

Airstrip

The drainage earth works has been completed, and the side marker drums have been completed.

The airstrip has been granted a radio license and the new lighting has been despatched from Melbourne.

The new windsock and concreting is to be completed in the next few weeks and then the airstrip will be fully functional.

Flood Damage

Beringarra Pindar Road

Northcoast Contractors have been working from Beringarra south to Nookawarra over the past few weeks re establishing some of the damaged road network. Over the next few weeks they will be continuing south of Nookawarra resheeting and re forming damaged sections of road. This is a tiresome task as there is not much road building material around, so the crew are doing an excellent job.

Trackwest will be reconstructing a 3km section of road south of Nookawarra Homestead utilising the "rock chopper" which smashes rocks up to 300mm into gravel size particles. This section of road will be treated with polycom as a trial for future reference when we have exhausted our road building material.

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Kalli Road

Northcoast Contractors will be heading that way soon.

Programmed Works

Erong Road

The Shire's construction team has been working on installing 26 bunds on the Erong Road, this is designed for road protection of the infrastructure we have in place. This process has involved training on our dozer for some operators and consultation with the land owners. The construction crew will be completing the flood damage areas of this road during this process.

The construction team will soon be heading towards the Mt Gould road to perform a similar road protection.

Beringarra Pindar Road- Near Murgoo Woolshed Road

Trackwest have completed the reconstruction of the road and drainage close to the Murgoo woolshed road. As many of you know this has long been a problem section. This section of road has had some trial work also completed on it. We have tried a section just water binding it, another section that has been cement stabilised, another Section that has 2% cement and a binding product called PK4 and another section with strait PK4. I will arrange signage for the trial sites, so you can have a look at the different products and how they perform.

What is the purpose of all these trials?

We are trying to establish some new techniques and utilise some new technologies in our reconstruction methods. This will lead to savings in construction and longer periods between re construction and ultimately a better road network.

Meeberie-Wooleen Road

Can anyone remember the corner on this road that has the wrong camber, well you may have missed the opportunity to drive the wrong way as it is currently being fixed as the monologue goes to print.

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Maintenance Grading

A section of road north of Tin Hut Creek has been completed and is now working south of Tin Hut Creek to the Settlement

The Meeberie Wooleen Road, Wooleen Boolardy Road, Meeberie Mt Wittenoom Road, and Pia Community have all received some maintenance grading.

Community Amenities

The community's patient transfer vehicle has been taken to Yalgoo to have the stretcher serviced. It is planned to take the PTV to Geraldton to be refurbished with new medical supplies.

CBD Development

Caravan Park

New electrical work is about 75% completed, including new lights and power outlets with the new RCD are fitted. This upgrade was necessary to comply with various Acts and Regulations.

Motel Unit

The 3 room budget accommodation unit has been totally stripped and is ready for lining the inside and outside. The new "turtle" roof will soon start to take shape.

Roadhouse

The sand pad has been completed utilising the excess gravel from the airstrip which has made a great sub base. Yellow sand has been imported to make the final sand pad ready for footings and concrete pad.

The plans are currently at the structural engineer before going to council for final approval and approvals of the planned budget.

Bridge 837 at Ballinyoo Bridge

The story so far.....

- The existing bridge known as 837 was constructed in 1929-30
- In the sixties a major repair operation was performed to support the failing pylons

- The bridge has been continually checked by Main Roads Engineers every seven years
- In 2002 a small grant was received to do some major repairs
- In 2008 BG & E engineers listed 7 options for the future of the bridge

Current Status of the bridge.....

- Community Consultation day was held on 6 July 2009
- After a heavy heart and emotional discussion on the future of the bridge the community decided that in the best interests of future generations of people in the Murchison that the financial burden to maintain the old bridge would be too great to impose on those future generations.
- The Council considered the three options for a new bridge;
- 1. Option One: build a new bridge 30 meters upstream
- 2. Option Two: build a new bridge 70 meters down stream
- 3. Option Three: build a new bridge on the existing alignment
- If the new bridge was built on a new alignment then the engineering report and support from Main Roads would be to build on the 70m downstream option
- The downstream option would require a new road alignment at a significant cost addition to the total project. This cost is estimated at \$1,000,000 extra to the project.
- The bridge on the existing alignment has a significant saving attached as no realignment, cultural and heritage issues are in existence.
- Council has received numerous letters from ex-residents and other interested parties.
- Council has endorsed to build the new bridge on the existing alignment.

Heritage Council Issues

- The bridge is not listed on the Heritage Councils register
- The Heritage Council has listed the bridge for an urgent review of its heritage status.
- The Heritage Council has contracted an engineering report and history compilation of the bridge.
- The Heritage Council requested the Minister for Heritage, John Castrilli, place a "Stop Work" order on the bridge to stop the bridge being demolished.

• The 'Stop Work" order is for 42 days and has since expired.

Where to from here.....

- The Shire Council has complied with the stop work order
- The Heritage Council will complete the investigation

Applications and submissions for consideration for funding are to be made in writing to the CEO

of Shire of Murchison who is the fund administrator, and should include as a minimum

requirement the following information:

- Name and address of community group or organisation.
- Objectives of community group or organisation including membership numbers and capacity to carry out project.
- Organisation's contact person and project manager if applicable.
- Purpose of the project or service.
- Community benefit gained by project.
- Project time lines.
- Extent of funding sought.
- Confirmation of in-kind contribution.
- Details of funding and/or applications for funding from alternative sources.

Important

Failure to supply or address the required details may render the applicant ineligible for grants.

Ensure all details are provided.

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<u>Assessment</u>

All applications will be assessed on their merit. Eligible applications will not necessarily be funded. We will give priority to projects that encourage community participation and development to reduce social isolation and provide long term benefit for the Murchison Community.

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The Anzac ceremony in France has again prompted me to make another appeal for some Road Board property.

There were 2 pictures hanging on the dining room walls at Boolardy as late as 1950. One was of the Cenothph in London and the other was Menin Gate at Midnight by Will Longstaff where the ghostly figures of soldiers were depicted. They were in gold frames about 80cm by 40.

Another was a photo of the HMAS Sydney which sank the German battle ship Emden in WW1. The frame was made from the teak from the Sydney's deck and carried a silver plaque. This hung in the Road Boards end of the station office. All were bought by the Board for some charity. After the office was moved to TwinPeaks in 1949/50 I feel they were sent there and when it moved again to Wooleen they may have gone there. They certainly did not come back to Boolardy when the office once more came back.

I have made extensive enquiries over the years to no avail. Someone must know something about them. They would have moved at a time when someone would have known their history. And not been destroyed I don't remember them at Boolardy after 1950. It may have got to our private store room. Some funny things happened and priceless records disappeared after we left in 1968.

Please give them a plug, it will fill in space and might reach some ones memory.

Gardening Jips

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10 Must-Grow Plants for the Self-Sustainable Garden



When you have unlimited resources and enough space to fling a Mack truck it doesn't matter what you grow. Even if you're trying to escape the supermarkets and remain self-sustainable, unlimited resources allows you to to be frivolous with your choices and grow any plant you like.

However, confine yourself to a suburban backyard and the options become very limited. No longer can you grow every exotic fruit or experiment with boutique vegetables. It now comes down to finding the most appropriate plants that will supply your needs throughout the year, and limiting your choices to just those ones.

So, if you were given the task of restricting your choice to just 10 plants, what would they be? Here's my 10 MUST grows for a suburban self-sustainable garden;

- 1. Lemon/Lime Tree ok, this one may border on the luxury end of the choice scale but when it comes to flavouring and preserving other foods, acidic limes are one of the best options you could grow. Plus, if you had a surplus you could always make lemonade or churn out your own marmalade.
- 2. Apple Tree this is your source of winter fruit. If you're not into apples you could always grow pears or even mandarins. The beauty of an apple tree is that it produces abundantly and can easily be espalliered against a boundary fence to minimize space. A good apple tree can keep you in fruit for most of the cooler months.
- 3. **Peach / Nectarine Tree** then there's the summer fruit to consider. You could opt for a berry vine instead but for the sheer amount of fruit that glupe producers offer it would be hard not to choose at least one. Not into peaches or nectarines? Then you could choose from apricots, plums or even loguats.
- 4. **Cabbages** a winter-growing vegetable. Cabbages are a great storing vegetable with a superb shelf-life. If you grow too much they can always be pickled and stored as sauerkraut.
- 5. **Tomatoes** tomatoes are the best fruit/veg that the self-sustainable gardener could grow. Not only do they taste great during the summer months but you can easily produce enough to can, bottle or freeze for the cooler months.
- 6. **Potatoes** the ultimate carbohydrate vegetable can be grown for at least nine months of the year and produce brilliant harvests. Potatoes, like cabbages, have a great shelf-life and provided they're kept in a cool, dry yet dark location should be able to keep you in stock for most of the year.
- 7. **Beans** with the range of beans available you can have these growing for almost six months of the year as well (depending on your climate). Beans are a great vegetable that lend themselves easily to being blanched and frozen for the winter months.
- 8. **Carrots** the ultimate all-rounder vegetable that will grow as a continual crop. Carrots can be grown at any time but if your area is too cold to support them during winter then they can be blanched and frozen like beans.
- 9. Lettuce while mostly considered as a summer vegetable, lettuce can also be grown indoors in a small hydroponic setup that gives you year-round supply. It's a great vegetable, especially the many new varieties that avail themselves to be picked indiscriminately and still continue growing.

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- 10. **Onions** the final choice in this list. I would have said garlic if I had another option but we're trying to limit ourselves here. Onions are a great option for the home self-sustainable garden. They store really well making them available in the off season and are great producers. Plus, like lemons, onions are a great flavouring for many dishes and are useful in pickling and preserving other vegetables.

Could that list satisfy you and your family? Or, would you need to embellish it with a few more choices or even replace some the ones I've mentioned.

Keeping Mosquitoes out of your Rain Barrels



As rain barrels become an important part of the garden landscape it can only be expected that they will become magnets for water-loving mosquitoes. In fact, with the phenomenal growth of rain barrels it should signal a disturbing trend that the mosquito population is set to explode.

Mosquitoes love any body of water that remains still long enough for them to release their larvae. Therefore it can only be expected that rain barrels will become a soft target for these pests to multiply. The water collects from your roof via downpipes and is then stored in these water drums to be used at a time that is most probably not regular. This source of water then becomes the best possible breeding ground a mosquito could wish for.

While I've discussed some mosquito control methods before here on GTNI, when it comes to rain barrels there needs to be different solutions - tipping the water out regularly kind of defeats the purpose. So, how can rain barrels and water storage exist without creating a habitat for man's most deadly insect? Easy...here's some gardening tips that should keep them out of your water storage drums forever.

1. Add a goldfish - small goldfish love mosquito larvae almost as much as we love chocolate. So why not add one, perhaps two, to each rain barrel. Provided they still have enough air - in other words don't lock off the top of the barrel - keeping a goldfish in your drums should be quite a simple task.

The benefit is twofold; 1). the fish will devour the larvae as soon as they are laid reducing your fish feeding bill, and 2). the ammonia excreted from the fish will produce beneficial nitrogen for your soil.

2. **Produce an oil slick** - we all saw how effective the Exxon Valdez spill was at killing wildlife, well the same principle applies here. Providing the water level in your rain barrels can be kept above the output spouts you can pour a layer of oil (preferably food-grade) on top of the water. This acts as a shield for insects getting into your barrels and laying their eggs plus if any eggs do survive they will soon die once they begin to develop into the larvae stage.

One important note, don't combine this method of mosquito control with the one above. The oil slick will stop the water being aerated and the fish will eventually die.

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☆ ☆ 3. Cover the intake with a filter - if the other two methods seem a little too bizarre for your liking then covering the intake is possibly the next best thing. A pair of nylon pantyhose should do the trick as they are fine enough to stop mosquito infestations but will still allow the water to seep through and collect in the barrels.

The downside of this method is that the filter will need to be checked often to ensure that they aren't breaking down or that holes aren't being produced. Even the smallest hole in these can become an access point for mosquitoes and their larvae.

4. **Chemical larvicides** - **microbial larvicides** are a chemical solution to the problem. If the three options listed above don't seem to deal with your problem, or if you're looking for an easy fix, then larvicides may be your next best option. Granular forms are most likely to be available at your local hardware or garden store and should be added as per the directions at times when mosquito activity is at its peak.

As with most chemical solutions it is only a matter of time until mosquitoes build up an immunity to these and they become ineffective or stronger. My advice would be to only use these if you can't find any resolution with the other ideas.

5. **Mosquito Dunks** - these are just a glorified form of larvicide making insertion easier for the user. They perform the same result as the method listed above but are more convenient in their packaging.

Hopefully one of these methods will work for your situation and help control mosquitoes breeding in your yard.

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Oh, it makes perfect sense, really!

The thought of storing your excess onions is one that can make any gardener a quivering mess. Why? Because you know that even after storing them in a cool, dry and dark pantry they're sure to still sprout or rot in a week or two. Keeping them for months or even a whole year is ludicrous.

But then one smart cookie read the storage directions on a bag they bought at the markets. And the tip? Store them in pantyhose. Of course!

It may seem a little absurd but the fashion accessory that women share a love/hate relationship with could just be the onion hanger of the century.

The idea is to start with a fresh pair of pantyhose that have been washed without chemicals. Once dried, each onion is placed into a leg pushing it right down into the bottom toes. Then a knot secures it in place and allows another to continue. Once the leg is full of onions, it's hung in the same pantry suspended from the roof space.

The benefits of doing this are numerous. First, the hose allow the air to circulate over the onions keeping molds and bacteria's from starting their ravaging feast. Plus, the pantyhose can easily be suspended keeping them off limited shelf space and because a knot is tied between each onion, one can be readily chopped from the leg without disturbing the others.

Ingenious - wouldn't you agree?

WA misses out on national cattle price rise

TRAVIS KING 25/09/2008 3:58:00 PM Eastern states' cattle markets registered near record prices last week, rubbing salt into WA beef.

The eastern states' price peak comes amid speculation in the WA industry this week that major beef processor and exporter, Harvey Beef, has dropped its schedule price by up to 20c/kg.

Harvey Beef chief executive officer Michael Rapattoni said the processor was back buying in the saleyards and price was price.

He would not comment any further.

The highest cow price recorded this year in the eastern states' physical markets was the 192.2c/kg liveweight registered at Casino, NSW, last Wednesday.

This was the highest price paid for cows at this market since September 2001, when a record price of 195.2c/kg lwt was set.

In contrast, the market continues to languish in WA.

Cow prices topped at 112c/kg lwt at Midland last week, while prices were even worse at last Thursday's Mount Barker sale with good cows selling for 80c-95c/kg.

Heavy bulls returned 102c-125c/kg, a little more than half of the prices received in the eastern states.

No one seems to be able to answer why WA cattle prices are so far behind.

What producers do know is that the industry, if it wasn't previously, is now at the crossroads.

Yornup beef producer Michael Campbell said WA's lack of competition is affecting cattle prices.


"Competition is the big thing and unfortunately in WA we suffer from a lack of it in both the processing sector and in the saleyard," he said.

"There is also a backlog of cattle in the system at the moment and while we have that build up prices

said earlier this year in WA Farmer he wants a more united approach from farmers to try to raise consumer awareness about the future of food production in WA.

Fact: Lightning has "favorite" sites that it may hit many times during one storm. Fiction: If it is not raining, then there is no danger from lightning.


Fact: Lightning often strikes outside of heavy rain and may occur as far as 10 miles away from any rainfall.


Fiction: The rubber soles of shoes or rubber tires on a car will protect you from being struck by lightning.

Fact: Rubber-soled shoes and rubber tires provide NO protection from lightning. However, the steel frame of a hard-topped vehicle provides increased protection if you are not touching metal. Although you may be injured if lightning strikes your car, you are much safer inside a vehicle than outside.

Fiction: People struck by lightning carry an electrical charge and should not be touched. Fact: Lightning-strike victims carry no electrical charge and should be attended to immediately.

Fiction: "Heat lightning" occurs after very hot summer days and poses no threat. Fact: What is referred to as "heat lightning" is actually lightning from a thunderstorm too far away for thunder to be heard. However, the storm may be moving in your direction!

Bush fires

As you know bush fire season is here so we all need to do our bit to ensure that we are safe from harm.

Please all check your fire fighting equipment to ensure that it is all in good order. This will ensure that if there is a fire we are all prepared for the event. Here are some other tips that could help for around the homestead.

Prepare for summer

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
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- Become more vigilant when thinking about protecting your home from fire.
- Prepare a 20 metre fire protection zone around your house.
- Store all flammable liquid safely in a shed or garage and away from the house.
- Clear gutters and the roof of leaves and debris.
- Make sure that your water hoses can reach every corner of the house.
- Test petrol or diesel driven pumps to ensure they work and have fuel.
- Ember proof your home by installing metal fly-screens or metal roller shutters to all windows, vents and chimneys.



- Cover plastic or glass sky lights with flat wire meshed glass or thermoplastic.
- Check that there are no open eaves or gaps in the roof which could allow flying embers to enter your roof space.
- Remove ignitable objects from around the outside of your house such as wood, fuel containers, general rubbish.
- LP Gas cylinders should be located on the side of the house furthest away from the approaching fire with the pressure release valve facing away from the house, and there should be no flammable material within 6 metres of the valve.
